# It’s a tall world after all for eager vacationers

## See new, returning Orlando-area sights

The phrase “new and must-do in ‘22” has a nice, rhyming ring for theme park lovers heading to the Orlando, Florida, area this new year.

Some oldies but goodies are returning like Mardi Gras celebrations at Universal Orlando and Walt Disney World’s Typhoon Lagoon water park, which just reopened for the first time since March 2020.

There are also brand-new adventures awaiting vacationers seeking sun, sand, or even a taste of outer space from the Star Wars universe or real life.

Guests should check with each venue in advance for face mask and admission policies, which are subject to change.

### SeaWorld Orlando

SeaWorld Orlando’s highly anticipated new Ice Breaker roller coaster will feature the “steepest beyond vertical drop in Florida,” according to the park.

A 93-foot-tall spike will send guests soaring at a 100-degree angle.

Ice Breaker officially opens on Feb. 18, but season pass holders will get an early preview.

### Walt Disney World

First and foremost: The trams are coming back! The trams are coming back!

After a long, COVID-19-forced hiatus that started when Walt Disney World reopened in July 2021, tram service returned from parking areas to Magic Kingdom in December, with Epcot, Hollywood Studios and Animal Kingdom to follow in 2022.

Typhoon Lagoon water park reopened on Sunday just as

### World’s Most Magical Celebration continues

It’s not totally new in ‘22, but the 18-month party that started on Oct. 1 will continue as Walt Disney World Resort celebrates its 50th anniversary.

And a couple of the new-to-all parts of the party are stellar standouts.

### Star Wars: Galactic Starcruiser

This one’s going to be the spaced-out treat of a lifetime for Star Wars fans: The inaugural voyage of Star Wars: Galactic Starcruiser at Walt Disney World Resort begins on March 1.

Galactic Starcruiser promises to be a two-night immersive event like no other in this neck of the woods, aboard the Halcyon starcruiser.

It’s billed as a vacation experience “going beyond anything Disney has created before, inviting guests to become the heroes of their own stories during a two-night adventure where they see, feel and live their own Star Wars story.”

Know in advance: This one’s expensive, with rates varying depending on how many are in

your party, the type of cabin you choose and when your voyage departs. For departures between Aug. 20, and Sept. 17: \$1,209 per guest, per night, or \$4,809 for the whole package.

Some of what’s included along with your stay: meals; admission to Disney’s Hollywood Studios for an excursion to Galaxy’s Edge; valet parking; a Star Wars: Galactic Starcruiser MagicBand; and “ongoing, immersive and interactive entertainment, where choices determine your experience.”

If you’re not on a “voyage,” you won’t be able to just walk in and look around, as at other Disney hotels.

Reservations are available by phone only at this time. Call (407) 939-1800 between 7 a.m. and 11 p.m. EST.

### Guardians of the Galaxy: Cosmic Rewind

Coming to EPCOT this summer, a coaster for the cosmos and the whole family – and for Guardians of the Galaxy fans, it should be nothing short of breathtaking.

Cosmic Rewind, officials say, will be the park’s first “other-world” showcase pavilion as well as the first reverse launch on a Disney coaster. You’ll travel through Xandar’s treasures “until the moment when the

Guardians of the Galaxy arrive, and an intergalactic chase through time and space begins.”

### Kennedy Space Center

If space exploration sends you into orbit, you won’t want to miss the March opening of Gateway: The Deep Space Launch Complex at Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex.

It will offer an up-close look at real spacecraft and “visionary designs for solutions to propel the pathway of human deep space travel.” Once inside the “spaceport of the future,” visitors will “launch on one of four spectacular deep space journeys.”

Visitor Complex entry is required.

### Universal Orlando

If you haven’t ridden VelociCoaster, why not? The newest attraction at Jurassic World at Universal Orlando’s Islands of Adventure opened last June , and it’s terrifying but thrilling.

Those who brave it can expect to go 155 feet in the air, plunge into an 80-degree drop, hit speeds of up to 70 mph and face an intense barrel roll right above the Islands of Adventure lagoon – in pursuit of the velociraptor gang from the “Jurassic World” films, Blue, Charlie, Delta and Echo.

### Rock the Universe

Florida’s biggest Christian music festival, created to support youth ministry, runs on Jan. 28 and Jan. 29. Rock the Universe acts include Casting Crowns, for KING & COUNTRY, Matthew West, Big Daddy Weave and Zach Williams.

### Mardi Gras is back

Laissez les bons temps rouler

er, y’all. Universal’s Mardi Gras returns to Universal Orlando Resort in 2022, running Feb. 6 through April 25. It’s billed as “louder, spicier and better than ever,” and a “family-friendly version of the iconic Big Easy bash.” Expect parades, concerts, Cajun cuisine and culinary choices from around the world at the parks and hotels.

This party’s included with Universal Studios Florida admission, or annual or seasonal passes, but blackout dates apply.

### Military Freedom Pass

This “thank you for your service” for active duty and retired military members gives military personnel and their families daily park entrance through Dec. 31, with no blackout dates. It covers both Universal Studios Florida and Universal’s Islands of Adventure, and it’s \$199.99 per adult. For an additional \$35, military personnel and their families can purchase the 3-Park 2022 Military Freedom Pass which includes admission to Universal’s Volcano Bay water theme park. Check for customizable vacation packages, too, that include hotel stays and theme park tickets.

### Brevard Zoo

You’ll need to “sea” this to grasp its beauty – and best of all, you’ll be at the Brevard Zoo as you take in “Life Beneath Our Sea.”

Twelve sand sculptures by world-class artists stand along the trail in Wild Florida, allowing guests to “venture under the sea.”

The exhibit opened in November, but if you haven’t had a chance to see it yet, “Life Beneath Our Sea” continues through April 30. Entrance is included with zoo admission.

# How to save on your wireless bill – if you can live with trade-offs

Your wireless carrier’s site won’t advertise this possibility, but you can drop your service and keep using its network.

Beyond the obvious option of the three nationwide carriers’ discounted prepaid offerings, you should consider other firms, some owned by the carriers, that resell their networks. A reseller can slash your connectivity costs – at the cost of some mainstream service perks.

Consider some ways to keep a lot of data and still enjoy your phone’s mobile hot spot feature.

### Verizon

Verizon Wireless Do More and Play More unlimited plans, each \$80 a month on one line, cover 50 gigabytes of priority data (meaning your connection shouldn’t slow to ease network congestion until you exceed that threshold), 15GB of mobile hot spot, and access to Verizon’s fast but scarce millimeter-wave 5G.

Verizon’s prepaid plans offer rates that drop after three and then nine months: Unlimited Plus, with “mm-wave” 5G but no priority data and only 10GB of hot spot, begin at \$75 and descends to \$60.

Visible, a Verizon subsidiary, offers unlimited data for just \$40 monthly. Its trade-offs: no priority data, mobile hot spot limited to 5 megabits per second on one device at a time, a 200Mbps speed limit – even on mm-wave 5G – and no in-store support.

**Alternatives to Verizon:** Broadband customers of the U.S.’s two biggest cable operators may find they offer better deals than Verizon’s network, mm-wave 5G included. Comcast Xfinity Mobile’s \$45 Unlimited plan has 20GB of priority data but a woeful 600Kbps hot-spot speed limit; its \$60 “By the Gig” \$60-per-month 10GB plan, however, covers full-speed hot-spot use. Charter’s Spectrum Mobile, meanwhile, has a \$45 Unlimited plan with 5GB of hot spot – but slows downloads to 1Mbps after 20GB.

### AT&T

AT&T customers have similar alternatives to its \$75 Unlimited Extra (50GB of priority data, 15GB hot spot). AT&T Prepaid’s Unlimited Plus runs \$50 on a new line for 22GB of priority data and 10GB of mobile hot spot – if you sign up for auto-pay.

**Alternatives to AT&T:** Cricket Wireless, an AT&T subsidiary, beats that via a \$55 unlimited prepaid plan with unlimited priority data and 15GB of mobile hot spot.

Or consider Consumer Cellular, a third-party service that also resells T-Mobile’s network: Its \$55 unlimited plan gives 50GB priority status. It has mobile hot spot turned off by default, but customer service will activate it for free.

### T-Mobile

At T-Mobile, its Magenta plan’s \$70 taxes-and-fees-included rate – with 100GB of priority data and 5GB of mo-

bile hot spot – leaves little to save with its prepaid Unlimited Plus, at \$60 before taxes for 50GB of priority data and 10GB of mobile hot spot.

**Alternative to T-Mobile:** Its Metro by T-Mobile prepaid service charges \$50 a month for unlimited data with 35GB of it priority (although T-Mobile subscriber traffic takes precedence) and 5GB of mobile hot spot, plus 100GB of Google One storage.

### Mint Mobile

And Mint Mobile, a third-party reseller, charges as little as \$30 a month for unlimited service with 35GB of priority data (also ranked below T-Mobile traffic) and 5GB of mobile hot spot. That discount, however, requires paying for at least three months’ service. Mint has no in-store help.

### The bad news

All these deals require two other trade-offs: They sell a more limited selection of phones, sometimes without installment-payment deals, and they don’t provide discounted international roaming – except, in some cases, Canada and Mexico.

### Buy unlocked

But limits suggest another way to spend less on wireless: skip the pricey flagship phones and buy a \$400-ish device like Apple’s iPhone SE or Google’s new Pixel 5a direct from the manufacturer and unlocked, freeing you to use cheap prepaid SIMs whenever you do travel internationally.

Pursuant to the Bar Date Order, each person or entity (including, without limitation, each individual, partnership, joint venture, corporation, estate, and trust) that holds or seeks to assert a claim (as defined in section 101(5) of the Bankruptcy Code) against the Debtors that arose, or is deemed to have arisen, prior to the Petition Date (including, without limitation, claims entitled to administrative priority status under section 503(b)(9) of the Bankruptcy Code), no matter how remote or contingent such right to payment or equitable remedy may be, **MUST FILE A PROOF OF CLAIM** on or before 5:00 p.m. (prevailing Eastern Time), on January 31, 2022 (the “General Bar Date”), by sending an original proof of claim form to Epq Corporate Restructuring, LLC (“Epiq”), or by completing the online proof of claim form available at <https://dm.epiq11.com/case/telgent>, so that it is **actually received** on or before the General Bar Date; *provided* that, solely with respect to governmental units (as defined in section 101(27) of the Bankruptcy Code), the deadline for such governmental units to file a proof of claim against the Debtors is April 12, 2022 at 5:00 p.m. (prevailing Eastern Time) (the “Governmental Bar Date”).
